In this service we will reflect on this text and consider what still rings true to us today.

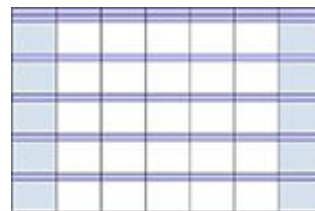

Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism

Our faith tradition is explicitly a non-creedal religion, meaning that you do not have to accept one truth to be a UU.



The Association of Congregations did decide in 1961, and again in 1987, that it benefited all of us to be able to articulate some common values, so that we could at a minimum discuss what brings most UU's together. And so the Principles of Unitarian Universalism were created. In 1961 those Principles were crafted to help the merger of Unitarians and Universalists declare shared values. In 1987, they were re-written with an additional 7th Principle which recognized the interdependent web of existence.

For many of us, the Seven Principles have been a key element that helps us identify, describe, and strive for a set of values. In the wake of the rise of the BLM movement and an awareness of the injustices of racial inequality, some were calling for the addition of an eighth principle to address racial justice.

In response, a Study Commission tasked with reviewing the basis for the Seven Principles (Article II of the UUA Bylaws) has issued a report and recommendation for a change. That recommendation will be presented for a vote by congregations at this year's General Assembly. The vote will determine if the proposed changes will be further discussed and refined, leading to a final vote to adopt them in 2024.

We will always honor people's individual choice to wear a mask at any time.

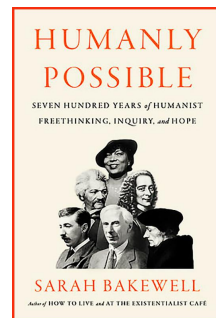

Evans Reading Group

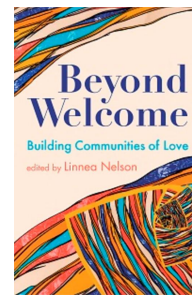
Regaining focus in post-pandemic daylight, the Evans Reading Group is pleased to invite your participation as we return to our Cedars practice of reading and discussing books that can intrigue and might enlighten us in seeking "Salvation by Bibliography" as our late friend Marvin Evans used to say.

Our current selection, proposed by Mary Romeo, is ***Humanly Possible***, a sweeping new study by Sarah Bakewell that takes readers on a grand intellectual adventure bringing extraordinary humanists together across history. Some of them sought to promote scientific and rationalist ideas, others put more emphasis on moral living, and still others were concerned with the cultural and literary studies known as "the humanities." The author explores what brings all these aspects of humanism together, and why it has such enduring power, despite opposition from fanatics, mystics, and tyrants.

How do we go beyond welcome to build compassionate, authentic, and equitable communities? In this Skinner House book released last year, editor Linnea Nelson and

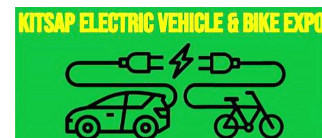
contributors dream of a future Unitarian Universalism that upholds abundant love and universal justice within every community.

Our identity as a congregational community is strengthened by the activities and gatherings we enjoy together, as well as by the ways we can find to know each other better.

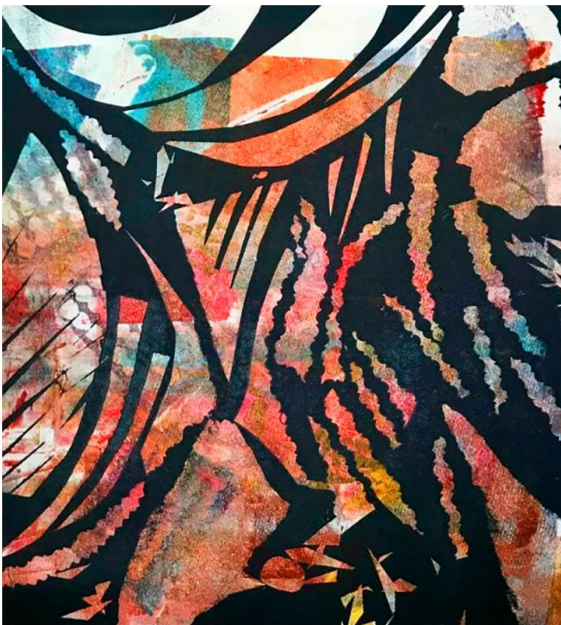

When you aren't sure if they're who they say they are, try comparing their email address with the one you have on file or contact the person via another form of communication to confirm that they sent the email.

If something seems off, it's best to be cautious!
