Congregational Meeting

The Cedars Board of Trustees will host the 2023 Annual Congregational Meeting directly after the

service on June 11th.

We will discuss and vote on a 2023-2024 budget proposed by the Board and the Budget Leadership Team to maintain Cedars programs and look toward growth in the coming year.

We will also discuss the proposal before all UU congregations regarding changes to the Seven Principles and Six Sources in the UUA Bylaws Article II. We will take a vote on your preferences, to inform voting delegates from Cedars to the UUA General Assembly.

Lastly, we will vote on a Board of Trustee candidate: Jeff Philip's 2 year term expires this year, but he is willing to extend his term one more year. We will vote on an extension to his term.

It is very important that we have a quorum at this meeting so that the votes are valid. We need 30% of our members to attend either inperson or via zoom. Therefore, we want and need as many people attending as possible.

If you cannot be present in-person or online via zoom for this meeting, but would like to vote, please e-mail Board Secretary **Andrea Barnes** for an absentee ballot. Absentee ballots will count as regular votes but **do not** count toward a quorum under the Cedars Bylaws.

The Democratic Process within our UU Congregation

The Seven UU Principles have been a central set of concepts to frame our values for over 30 years. This Sunday, after the service, we will gather at our annual Congregational Meeting to practice the Fifth Principle, by engaging in the democratic process. I hope you will be able to attend with us.

Interestingly, one of the items on our agenda is how the Congregation would like our Delegate to General Assembly to vote on the **Proposed Article II Revision**, which would change the Seven Principles to a set of Values. This is a great opportunity to express our voice among the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations.

We will also vote on other matters, including our annual budget, appointments to the Board of Trustees and Nominating Committee, as well as some good discussion on what you would like to see at Cedars in the Year ahead.

General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian

Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles.

Participants worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through democratic process. Anyone may attend; congregations must certify voting delegates. Join us June 21 - 25, 2023 online or in-person in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism



Our faith tradition is explicitly a non-creedal religion, meaning that you do not have to accept one truth to be a UU.

The Association of Congregations did decide in 1961, and again in 1987, that it benefited all of us to be able to articulate some common values, so that we could at a minimum discuss what brings most UU's together. And so the Principles of Unitarian Universalism were created. In 1961 those Principles were crafted to help the merger of Unitarians and Universalists declare shared values. In 1987, they were re-written with an additional 7th Principle which recognized the interdependent web of existence.

For many of us, the Seven Principles have been a key element that helps us identify, describe, and strive for a set of values. In the wake of the rise of the BLM movement and an awareness of the injustices of racial inequality, some were calling for the addition of an eighth principle to address racial justice.

In response, a Study Commission tasked with reviewing the basis for the Seven Principles (Article II of the UUA Bylaws) has issued a report and recommendation for a change. That recommendation will be presented for a vote by congregations at this year's General Assembly. The vote will determine if the proposed changes will be further discussed and refined, leading to a final vote to adopt them in 2024. Much hard work and dedication goes into providing music for our Sunday services. And each week we are grateful for those willing to make music and lead us all in song. This week, we offer special thanks to **Audrey Blair** for music accompaniment.
